

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# THIRTY EIGHTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 23RD SEPT.1964. SECRETARIAL REPORT

- 1. In our 37th year membership reached a total of 181 which was a decrease of 31 on last year (65 new members this year).
- 2. Last year, our president, Archbishop Heenan, was appointed to the see of Westminster. To take his place we invited Archbishop Beck, and we are very pleased that he kindly accepted our invitation to become our third President.
- 3. A ramble was held every Sunday or Bank Holiday. The average attendance was approximately 22.

Special rambling events included:-

- a) A Keswick weekend.
- b) A Grasmere weekend.
- c) A Yuletide walk including a hot-pot-supper and social attendance 120.
- d) Three Chalet weekends.
- e) Two coach trips to Church Stretton for football games with St. Mary's Seminary.
- g) A Joint Walk with Birmingham Catholic Ramblers' Attendance 85, including 35 L.C.R.A.
- h) A day trip to Blackpool.
- 4. There were 47 socials held during theyear, including a Hallowe'en dance; a Christmas party; two films by The British Railway's on Western Scotland and the Lake District; a talk and slides given by Fr. Atherton on Ash Wednesday on the life on Our Lord; a talk and a film on retreats given by Fr.McCarten from Bishop Eaton Monastery; a slide show given by Eddie Quina featuring his colour transparencies of past rambling events; two films given by Bernard Duffey about the Matterhorn and the Isle of Skye; two beat group nights and a discussion circle led by Fr.Francis J. Ripley.

Average attendance was 59, an increase of approximately 1 per week over last year.

- 5. Two dances were held during the year, one at the Grafton Rooms and a Leap Year dance at the State Ballroom.
- 6. The Rosary was recited on the first Wednesday of each month throughout the year.
- 7. A party booking was made at the Philharmonic Hall for the Christmas Carol Concert.
- 8. The 18th post-war tennis season was preceded by the usua hard work in preparing the courts and pavilion. The pavilion has been re-wired and a light has been installe in the toilet and one outside the pavilion. There has been a new set of posts and nets erected on No.1 court.

To stimulate interest in tennis two singles competitions were introduced, one for ladies and one for gents — bein the principle innovation this season. The two champions will each receive a trophy.

Membership reached 41. Two teams once again played in the Liverpool L.T.A. Successful American Tournaments we held, but socials did not prove quite so successful duri season.

- 9. The Joint Tennis dance at the Grafton was attended by 45 making our share in the profits £13.
- 10. The News Letter in its 18th post-war year was issued eve two months.
- 11. The football team played its 16th post-war season in th Liverpool Central Amateur league.

#### THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Another A.G.M. has come and gone. One feels it could be rightly claimed that it had been creeping stealtherly up on us in the weekspreceding 23rd September unnoticed by many. Having arrived at the appointed hour, its reluctance to find the limelight was plain for all to see. It will probably go down as one of the quietest A.G.Ms. in the Association's long history Most of the meeting was taken up with the presentation of the various reports, and the election of officers for the coming year. There seemed to be virtually no "bones of contention" to be thrashed out, which in some respects, appeared to be contrary to belief in some quarters. added up to a meeting which, from a committee members point of view did not offer much in the way of suggestions. He has, however, accepted the position of Trustee of the Association, and consequently, we shall still be able to avail ourselves of his experience and council in deciding the many important issues which arise from time to time in the running of any Association such as ours.

#### ANNUAL MASS AND DAY OF RECOLLECTION.

The annual mass for deceased members, members, relatives and friends of the Association, was held at St.Nicholas', Copperas Hill, Sunday, 27th September. Approximately sixty members attended, which on the whole was very satisfactory. It was particularly gratifying to see in the

congregation some of the married members, who, because of family ties, are not now able to visit us as often as they would like. Mr. and Mrs Tony Atherton, Mr. and Mrs. Gerry McDonald and Mr. Bill Wildes all attended with their familes. Canon Doyle was, unfortunately, unable to give his customary welcome, being still in the process of recuperating from his recent illness. All members will join in wishing him a speedy return to complete health.

After Mass, the majority followed that which has become the custom on these occasions, by adjourning to Lyon's for lunch or just a cup of tea and a "natter". Twenty—seven members went to Immaculata House, Aigburth, in the afternoon, to attend the short Day of Recollection which had been arranged. It was given by Fr.J. Beirne, who is the resident priest there. The afternoon consisted of two talks and a "Question—Time" period. The Rosary was also recited and the proceedings were concluded by Benediction, followed by a cup of tea and a biscuit before dispersing at about 6 p.m.

The visit to Immaculata House was something of an experimer but was clearly a success so far as those who attended were concerned. "Question-Time" in particular sparked off one or two heated debates on various topics, and some of the orators seemed set to carry on the debate long after the day had officially been concluded. This would, undoubtedly have been the case but for the bravery and fortitude of one young lady, waiting to be escorted home to tea by one of the two principle contestants. Seizing each of the gentlemen in turn she dispatched them outside "post-haste"
