



DONT'S FOR MEMBERS OF RAMBLING CLUBS

- (1) Don't be afraid of the leader. Address him by his Christian name, and afterwards call him all the names you can think of.
- (2) Don't keep too near the leader, it interferes with his breathing. About half-amile behind is a nice convenient distance, and it doesn't make the countryside look crowded.
- (3) Don't be at the station to o soon, and don't worry if you have not time to buy a ticket. Stick to the leader, and he will see you through.
- (4) Don't hesitate to blame someone if the weather turns out wet.
- (5) Don't forget to ask the leader if the party is lost any time he stops to look round and particularly if he chances to consult a map. You have a right to know what is going on, and a proper leader should not need a map.
- (6) Don't take the climbing of stone walls quietly. Converse in a loud voice about Mr. So-and so, and what a fine leader he was, and that you feel sure there must be another way round.
- (7) Don't scruple to criticise the leader if you get separated from the party,
- (8) Don't be afraid to shout out if the party goes too fast for you. Start to sentimentalise about the view. If the leader is short-sighted, appropriate his glasses. That will make him slow down.

- (9) Don't forget to ask about tea immediately the station is out of sight. It shows your interested in the ramble.
- (10) Don't carry any small change with you, and don't pay for a tenpenny tea with less than half-a-sovereign. If the man with the plate gets sarcastic, take your money back and snub him.
- (11) Don't forget to leave your umbrella on the mantlepiece at the tea-place, and break the news gently to the leader when about halfway back to the station. He will be delighted especially if there is only just time to catch the last train home.

A couple of weeks ago one of our ever thoughtful subcommittees presented to the club a large number of holiday brochures which club members were able to read and or take home as desired.


