

WINTER SPORTS:

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Have you ever wished that you could pack your bags and go to Australia or South Africa for the winter to bask in the sunshine. Too expensive you say. Well I was persuaded to do next best and what a surprise was in store. Friends at work persuaded me to try a winter ski-ing holiday in Austria.

Three of us left London Airport on a cold January night heading for Basle from where we caught a train crossing the Swiss border into Austria. The sky still overcast reminded me of England though the steep wooded mountainside rising into the grey swirling mist hiding the savage peaks told of the tyrol. Still apprehensive we unpacked in our hotel and hurried to lunch.

The Sunday church bells woke the sleepy valley and heralded a delightful fresh morning with puffs of cloud hanging desparately to the snowcapped peaks beneath the clear blue sky and a golden light (my word the sun;;) lit the village of Solden and all around.
